A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR

As I mentioned last week, my pastor's column is written many days ahead of the weekend. With a changing situation, it could be totally outdated by the time you read it.



As I write, we are having no Masses open to the public. I assure you that Fr. James and I are offering daily Masses for the parish and joining your prayers with the great prayer of Christ. This is the most severe Lenten fast any of us have known. During this time, a Spiritual Communion is a joining as one in heart and soul, even though we can't do so physically. Please be faithful to the Mass. Masses are available on TV and the Bishop is live-streaming a Mass at 10:00 a.m. on Sunday mornings. Go to the diocesan website, diocesefwsb.org, for information about the many Mass options.

Many parishes are livestreaming daily Masses and Sunday Masses. Fr. James and I are still thinking about this, while our staff is working out the technology. With Masses available from so many other venues, I'm not sure it is critical to have routine broadcasts from each parish. I think, though, that it would be a great benefit to families who have a funeral or a wedding during this time of isolation.

We have had many calls for confessions, and I am grateful for that. We are using the Bride's Room (on the left side of the Gathering Space) for confessions. It is a large room with a screen for those who prefer anonymity. We also have a chair placed six feet away from the priest for those who prefer face-to-face confessions. We have chairs set out in the Gathering Space for anyone who wants to wait in line. These chairs are placed six feet apart. If you do come for confession, I would ask that you thoroughly wash your hands before you come and after you leave. You will encounter door handles and could touch other surfaces.

After writing this column, the governor issued a "stay at home" order. That may tragically cut out most confessions. I am not sure. I am hoping that we will be safer by Good Friday and priests can be available for confessions that day.

As I write this column, I know of four parishioners who are ill and likely COVID-19 positive. Everything we read tells us that that we probably have many others who are not ill, yet carrying the virus. We find the many precautions to be a burden, but there is good reason that we must be very careful.

We pray for the scientists who are working for vaccines and treatments. We pray for the medical personnel who put their lives on the line to help. We pray for all who are sick and for their families. And we pray for our Church. May this time separated from Sacraments, help us not to be complacent, but to grow in our hunger for the Lord. May the Lord deliver us.

PRAYER FOR SPIRITUAL COMMUNION

My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love You above all things and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least into my heart. I embrace You as if you were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen.
