



Gibault Envoy Conference

On Saturday September 27th, I and my wife "Sis" and Mike Smith, our Council's Gibault Envoy, attended the Fall Envoy Conference on the Terre Haute campus of Gibault Children Services. All Knights, their spouses, and families of the children living there were invited



to attend in hopes of bringing a better awareness of what Gibault is all about. There were 8 or 9 families of the 64 residents living there who attended, which does not sound like a very positive response to us, however, to the Gibault staff it was very positive.

Our day began in the Chapel with coffee, juice, pastries and of course the sale of raffle tickets. We were required to sign a document saying we would not take any pictures or interact with the residents except those who had chosen to be a part of the day's activities. Following the opening prayer and pledge of allegiance we listened to several of the K of C State officers, including State Deputy, Gil Spisak tell us of the history of the K of C and Gibault, the importance of the Knights support of Gibault and what a K of C/Gibault Envoy's responsibilities are. The usual parade of checks netted a total of \$84,000 for Gibault from the local Councils presenting and from the State Council. Council 451 Envoy, Mike Smith, presented a check for \$700 which is in addition to the several thousand dollars we contribute throughout the year. He also presented a check from St. Judes' council for \$500.

We then listened to Michelle Madley, CEO of Gibault, talk about Gibault, the residents, where they come from, the facilities and the business side of the organization. A council of five staff members decides if a child will be accepted for treatment at Gibault, not everyone, especially those with a criminal background, are accepted. There is a staff member with each resident as they move about the grounds, usually 2 or 3 for each dormitory. So, you can see a large staff is needed. Normally they would have 10 psychologists on staff, at the present time they only have five psychologists. A change in State law allows psychologists to set up their own practice sooner with less experience, making it difficult for Gibault to fulfill their needs.

Michelle then discussed some of the financial difficulties Gibault faces. First off, their insurance costs will triple from \$700,000 to \$2,100,000. After nine years of operating in the black they are expecting to have a loss of more than a million dollars. She also explained how being such an efficient operation has been a detriment when it comes to being reimbursed by the State. They receive only \$790/day/resident while other similar facilities receive nearly \$1,100/ resident. Maybe the higher insurance cost will increase their per diem. She also expressed her gratitude to the Knights for all the support they provide.

After the morning events we enjoyed a picnic lunch in the cafeteria with desserts provided by the children. Following lunch, some of the kids participating in art therapy displayed their assignments and gave explanations to help the guest understand their paintings.

My wife and I attended an education open house given by the principal of the junior/senior high school. He explained the classes and the digital education the older kids receive. It was interesting to note that the desks were bolted to the floor for safety reasons. We explored the memorabilia room followed by a guided tour of the grounds by one of the staff members. Our guide did a wonderful job of educating us as to the day-to-day operations at Gibault.

We enjoyed our visit to Gibault and have great appreciation for doing all they do to help the unfortunate children of society.







Saint Maria Goretti

At our council's general meeting earlier this month, Deacon Rob brough with him a first-class relic of St. Maria Goretti and shared information with us about what relics are and the role they play in the faith life of Catholics. He mentioned that so many brothers were interested in learning more about St. Maria, that he asked that we share her story with you in case you also would like to learn more.

Saint Maria Goretti (October 16, 1890 – July 6, 1902)

Feast Day: July 6

Saint Maria Goretti's Story

One of the largest crowds ever assembled for a canonization—250,000—symbolized the reaction of millions touched by the simple story of Maria Goretti. She was the daughter of a poor Italian tenant farmer, had no chance to go to school, never learned to read or write. When Maria made her First Communion not long before her death, she was one of the larger and somewhat backward members of the class.

On a hot afternoon in July, Maria Goretti was sitting at the top of the stairs of her house, mending a shirt. She was not quite 12 years old, but physically mature. A cart stopped outside, and a neighbor, 18-year-old Alessandro, ran up the stairs. He seized her and pulled her into a bedroom. She struggled and tried to call for help. "No, God does not wish it," she cried out. "It is a sin. You would go to hell for it." Alessandro began striking at her blindly with a long dagger.

Maria Goretti was taken to a hospital. Her last hours were marked by the usual simple compassion of the good—concern about where her mother would sleep, forgiveness of her murderer (she had been in fear of him but did not say anything lest she cause trouble to his family), and her devout welcoming of Viaticum, her last Holy Communion. She died about 24 hours after the attack.

Alessandro was sentenced to 30 years in prison. For a long time, he was unrepentant and surly. One night he had a dream or vision of Maria Goretti gathering flowers and offering them to him. His life changed. When he was released after 27 years, his first act was to beg the forgiveness of Maria's mother.

Devotion to the young martyr grew, miracles were worked, and in less than half a century she was canonized. At her beatification in 1947, her 82-year-old mother, two sisters, and her brother appeared with Pope Pius XII on the balcony of St. Peter's. Three years later, at Maria's canonization, a 66-year-old Alessandro Serenelli knelt among the quarter-million people and cried tears of joy.

Sacred Heart Church; Fort Wayne, IN - Sacred Heart Church has been blessed with over 250 first-class relics of the saints, and a few second-class relics. There is an area in the back of the church conducive to prayer where all of our relics are displayed for the faithful. There are guidebooks that show the locations of the relics in our custody. They also expose in the sanctuary the relics that we have on a saint's feast day and offer them to the veneration of the faithful on that day.
